NOTICE TO BIDDERS

Notice is hereby given that the City of Batesville herein referred to as the Owner, will receive sealed bids for the 2025-1 Community Crossings Paving Program - Application #14105, located in the City of Batesville, Ripley County, Indiana.

Sealed bids are invited and may be forwarded by mail, other courier service or in person to the City of Batesville, Attn: John Kuntz, 132 S Main Street, Batesville, IN 47006 until 11:30 am on April 29, 2025. Bids received after such hour will be returned unopened. Bids will be opened and publicly read aloud at the Special Bid Opening meeting at this time. Bids will then be taken under advisement for review by the owner and engineer.

The contract will consist of the following:
2025-1 CCMG Paving and associated work items of various streets throughout the City of Batesville.

Electronic bidding documents are available by emailing jkuntz@batesville.in.gov. A hard copy of the bidding documents are available at the City's Engineering office at 132 South Main Street, Batesville, IN 47006.

Each bid must be enclosed in a sealed envelope bearing the title of the Project and the name and address of Bidder. All bids must be submitted in the bid forms as identified in the Contract Documents.

Each bid shall be accompanied by a certified check or acceptable bidder's bond made payable to the Owner, in a sum of not less than five percent (5%) of the total amount of the bid, which check or bond will be held by the Owner as evidence that the bidder will, if awarded the contract, enter into the same with the Owner upon notification from him to do so within ten (10) days of said notification.

Approved performance and payment bonds guaranteeing faithful and proper performance of the work and materials, to be executed by an acceptable surety company, will be required of the Contractor at the time he executes his contract. The bond will be in the amount of 100% of the Contract Price and must be in full force and effect throughout the term of the Construction Contract plus a period of twelve (12) months from the date of substantial completion.

The Owner reserves the right to reject any bid, or all bids, or to accept any bid or bids, or to make such combination of bids as may seem desirable, and to waive any and all informalities in bidding. Any bid may be withdrawn prior to the above scheduled time for the opening of bids or authorized postponement thereof. Any bid received after the time and date specified shall not be considered. No bid may be withdrawn after the scheduled closing time for receipt of bids for at least sixty (60) days.

The Owner may make such investigations as deemed necessary to determine the ability of the Bidder to perform the work and the Bidder shall furnish to the Owner all such information and data for this purpose as the Owner may request. The Owner reserves the right to reject any bid if the evidence submitted by, or investigation of, such Bidder fails to satisfy the Owner that such Bidder is properly qualified to carry out the obligations of the Agreement and to complete the work contemplated therein.

Bids shall be properly and completely executed on bid forms included in the Contract Documents. Bids shall include all information requested by Indiana Form 96 (Revised 2013) included in the Contract Documents.

If project is \$150,000 or more - State of Indiana requirement as of 7/2018, Bidder is required to submit with bid a written plan for an employee drug testing program that complies with IC 4-13-18-5 and IC 4-13-18-6.

Each Bidder is responsible for inspecting the Project site(s) and for reading and being thoroughly familiar with the Contract Documents and Specifications. The failure or omission of any Bidder to do any of the foregoing shall in no way relieve any Bidder from any obligation with respect to its Bid.

Police respond to disturbance and take Jailer to jail

In the early evening hours of Friday April 4, Jennings County Deputies were dispatched to Butleville in reference to a disturbance. Multiple 911 callers were reporting an accident between an ATV and a passenger car. Callers also stated that a male subject was on the hood of the car trying to keep the car from leaving the scene. While enroute Jennings County Dispatch received information that shots had been fired during the altercation. Deputies quickly arrived on scene and located the passenger car parked in a gravel lot with a female driver awaiting law enforcement arrival. The female operator of the vehicle provided a statement to Deputies and remained cooperative. Deputies were able to conclude that there was no sufficient evidence to indicate that a collision occurred between the ATV and the passenger car. While speaking with the other party it was determined that the male subject, which climbed onto the hood of the passenger car displayed a firearm and fired multiple shots into the nearby ground. As a result, Harlan Pennycuff, 26, of North Vernon was arrested on the following preliminary charges: Level 3 Felony-Criminal Confinement, Level 6- Pointing a Firearm, and Level 6- Criminal Recklessness with a deadly weapon. Harlan Pennycuff was also immediately terminated from his job as a Jennings County Jail Officer.



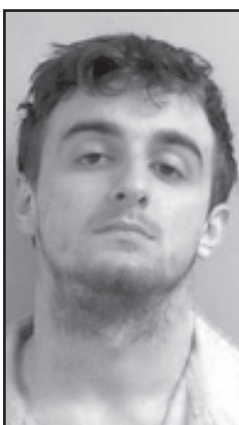

Sunman man arrested on burglary charges

Early on Sunday morning, March 30, Ripley County Deputies responded to a business alarm at Sunman Auto Care, 201 N. Meridian Street. Deputies arrived on the scene within 11 minutes and observed the front door glass had been broken. They quickly collected evidence and identified a suspect that Deputy Justin Linkel had encountered the previous day for an unrelated reason. Deputies began a search nearby for the suspect, and detained 21-year-old Dakota Myers from Sunman. Dakota Myers was arrested and booked into the Ripley County Jail on preliminary charges of Burglary, Un-

lawful Entry of a Motor Vehicle, and Possession of Marijuana.

The Ripley County Sheriff's Office was assisted by the Sunman Police Department, Marshal Bryan Maynard, Indiana State Police, and Sunman Rescue 20. Deputy Justin Linkel was the investigating officer according to Sheriff Rob Bradley.

Agricultural Producers have until April 15 to enroll in USDA's Key Commodity Safety Net Program for the 2025 Crop Year

Agricultural producers who have not yet enrolled in the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs for the 2025 crop year have until April 15, 2025, to revise elections and sign contracts. Both safety net programs, delivered by USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), provide vital income support to eligible farmers who experience substantial declines in crop prices or revenues for the 2025 crop year. In Indiana, producers have completed 91,519 contracts to date, representing 80.2% of the more than 114,000 expected contracts.

"Agriculture Risk Coverage or Price Loss Coverage programs provide excellent risk protection, for market declines, at no cost to the producer," said Susan Houston, Deputy State Executive Director, for FSA in Indiana. "If you haven't made your program election or signed a contract, please contact your local FSA county office as soon as possible to set an appointment so you don't miss the April 15 deadline."

Producers can elect coverage and enroll in ARC-County or PLC, which provide crop-by-crop protection, or ARC-Individual, which protects the entire farm. Although election changes for 2025 are optional, producers must enroll, with a signed contract, each year. If a producer has a multi-year contract on the farm, the contract will continue for 2025 unless an election change is made.

If producers do not submit their election revision by the April 15, 2025, deadline, the election remains the same as their 2024 election for eligible commodities on the farm. Also, producers who do not complete enrollment and sign their contract by the deadline will not be enrolled in ARC or PLC for the 2025 year and will not receive a payment if one is triggered. Farm owners can only enroll in these programs if they have a share interest in the commodity.

Producers are eligible to enroll farms with base acres for the following commodities: barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium and short grain rice, safflower seed, seed cotton, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and wheat.

Web-Based Decision Tools

Many universities offer web-based decision tools to help producers make informed, educated decisions using crop data specific to their respective farming operations. Producers are encouraged to use the tool of their choice to support their ARC and PLC elections.

Crop Insurance Considerations

Producers are reminded that enrolling in ARC or PLC programs can impact eligibility for some crop insurance products offered by USDA's Risk Management Agency (RMA). Producers who elect and enroll in PLC also have the option of purchasing Supplemental Coverage Option (SCO) through their Ap-

proved Insurance Provider, but producers of covered commodities who elect ARC are ineligible for SCO on their planted acres.

Unlike SCO, RMA's Enhanced Coverage Option (ECO) is unaffected by participating in ARC for the same crop, on the same acres. Producers may elect ECO regardless of their farm program election.

Optimizing FSA Office Visits

Agricultural producers visiting FSA to complete ARC/PLC elections and enrollment are encouraged to also conduct other FSA program business during their scheduled appointment including completing farm loan applications and applying for the recently announced Emergency Commodity Assistance Program (ECAP).

Sign up for ECAP began on March 19, 2025. ECAP, authorized by the American Relief Act, 2025, provides up to \$10 billion to agricultural producers for the 2024 crop year. Administered by FSA, ECAP will help agricultural producers mitigate the impacts of increased input costs and falling commodity prices. Congress gave USDA 90 days to implement the program, and that deadline was met. Producers of eligible commodities must submit ECAP applications to their local FSA county office by Aug. 15, 2025. Only one application is required for all ECAP eligible commodities nationwide. ECAP applications can be submitted to FSA in-person, electronically using Box and One-Span, by fax or by applying online at fsa.usda.gov/ecap utilizing a secure login.gov account. More details are forthcoming on more than \$20 billion to be made available through the American Relief Act, 2025, for producers who suffered losses from natural disasters in 2023 and 2024 including \$2 billion set aside for livestock producers and other funds that will be administered through block grants with states.
